A Eucharist Story

Except that she accidentally added a zero. Um, I don't think I ever completed that obligation.

So, I don't do ejaculations? Oh, wait. I have earworm!\* That is to say, I have melodies running constantly through my mind. All the time! Or at least, when there's "nothing going on." And what melodies? What do you think? I attend Mass and pray the Divine Office. I plan prayer services. I'm in a choir, a Catholic nuns' choir. So, the silent parts of my days can sound like:

Holy God, we praise thy name.

The king of love, my shepherd is.

My soul doth magnify the Lord.

Make me an instrument of your peace.

May Jesus Christ be praised.

Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

Blood of Jesus, strength of martyrs.

Pray always. Do it your own way—God will let you know how (and he may make use of your faults)--but pray always.
